The University of Heidelberg offers more than 9000 courses a semester, so you are sure to find courses that interest you and meet your credit requirements. Please keep in mind that courses are subject to change and are not limited to the examples we provide here.

AJY Courses

AJY courses are taught at the Study Center by the AJY Resident Director and adjunct faculty. They are exclusive to AJY students and specifically catered to their level of German.

1) Pre-Semester Intensive Language Course

After arrival in Heidelberg, students participate in a **mandatory 4-week intensive language course**. Students will be placed according to their level of German (intermediate, advanced intermediate, advanced).

The course consists of two parts:

- 1. Sixty (60) hours of intensive practice in listening and reading comprehension, advanced German grammar and vocabulary, text analysis and text production, preparing the students for the University's German Language Proficiency Examination (DSH).
- **2.** The course is supplemented by site-visits to local institutions in Heidelberg and by visits from guest-speakers. These are designed to complement course materials and introduce students to Heidelberg and German culture.

2) Contemporary Controversies in German Culture

The AJY Seminar is offered during the semester and, depending on demand, will be taught in two sections. While this course is not mandatory, participation is recommended.

The course is designed for German students who wish to further develop their German language skills and learn to debate the most central issues and controversies of contemporary affairs. In terms of content, we will delve into the political system of Germany and the federal elections, debate sustainability and climate protection, and the controversy surrounding Berlin's Humboldt Forum (which in turn has brought Germany's colonial past into focus), among other topics. We will also enrich the course with field trips and guests - for example, we will incorporate a visit to the Berlin Humboldt Forum into the course and talk to representatives of the parties' youth organizations about the election and the formation of the government. At the end of each module, after a thorough study of facts and arguments and sometimes artistic contributions (e.g. political satire, film), there will be a model debate in which all course participants will take on a role that they have specifically rehearsed. This course is also specifically about preparing for these debates by studying and practicing idioms, phrases, and grammatical structures that will be used both in the debate itself and in short presentations and essays.

Common Courses for Students of German as a Foreign Language

The International Study Centre (ISZ) and the Institute of German as a Foreign Language Philology (IDF) offer courses for international students at the University of Heidelberg. These courses are offered at all levels of German proficiency.

Some examples are:

Creative Writing in German – a class in which you learn how to express yourself by writing lyrical pieces in German

A Canon of German Literature – an advanced German literature class

German History – a course that teaches German history in a European context

German through Film – designed to develop a critical vocabulary for the analysis of cinema

IdeFix German Theater Group – a theater group of students whose first language is not German

Economy & Economic Geography – a course on globalization, sustainability, and local economic structures

Introduction to the Political System of Germany – a course on German politics and the political system of Germany

<u>Specialized Language (Fachsprache) Courses for Students of German as a Foreign Language</u>

We recommend these classes to accompany your studies in one of these fields or to Full Year students to prepare you for a course you might take in one of these fields in your second semester at the University of Heidelberg.

The Departments at the University of Heidelberg

Courses in English at the University of Heidelberg

As a full-immersion program we encourage our students to take all their courses in German. However, for many students it can be a necessary or attractive part of the program to take certain courses for a major without a language barrier. This often applies to STEM students for which the University of Heidelberg has developed an impressive course selection in English. Therefore, we accept one course per semester in English.

Most offerings are in the following areas:

- **Medical Faculty of Heidelberg** (approx. 100 courses a semester), including seminars, lectures, and labs.

- **Mathematics and Computer Science** (approx. 60 courses a semester), including seminars, lectures, and tutorials.
- Institute for Physics and Chemistry (approx. 10 courses a semester)
- Physics and Astronomy (approx. 200 courses a semester), including seminars, lectures, and tutorials.
- **Biology and Environmental Studies** (approx. 220 courses a semester) including lectures, seminars, and labs.

Additional courses in English are commonly offered in these departments:

Theology, Law, Philosophy, History, Economics, Sociology, Earth Sciences, Centre for Asian and Transcultural Studies, Heidelberg Center for American Studies, Heidelberg Center for Cultural Heritage, Judaic Studies, Transcultural Studies, English Department
